



We lift them up to God.


Let us give thanks to the God of mercy and grace.


It is right to give our thanks and praise.

God of grace, we thank you for sending your Son into the shrouded world that dawning light might give hope to all who are broken, persecuted, alienated and excluded, and that we might know your reign drawing near. We thank you that in the darkening hour, you open our eyes to see your starlit beauty, part the wide heavens to send your gentle light, and offer your word to take our mortal flesh.

Jesus was promised by those who shared your dream of peace— John the Baptist, who cleared his way with words of desert fire, and Mary and Joseph who accepted his coming with tenderness and faith. We know that he draws near again to show us who we really are with honesty and love.

Cantor: Now we take up the song of hope that we might awaken to his coming among us and that the world might be touched by the footfall of his glory:





Presider: We ask that your Holy Spirit will fall upon us and upon these gifts, that these fragile earthly things may be to us the body and blood of Christ; who, on the night that he was betrayed, gathered with his faltering friends for a meal that tasted of freedom.


Cantor: As on that night, so here and now Christ offers himself in touch and taste beyond all that words can hold. Great is the mystery of faith:

Let your Spirit, O God, brood over us with your gentle power, that we may become what we receive and be for the world the body of Christ.




By this holy meal, make us hunger and thirst for the advent of your reign, where love and truth shall meet, and justice and peace shall kiss.





If you are participating in this service by video distribution, please know that you and whatever elements are available for you to eat and drink are blessed and you are loved.]

Thanksgiving Prayer:

Bountiful God, we give you thanks for the gift of your presence in the simplicity and splendor of this holy meal. Unite your people of all faiths and spiritualities who have been fed by this blessing so that we may each faithfully proclaim the good news of your love. Strengthen our faith and increase our love for one another.

Send us out into a troubled and uncertain world to be rainbows of hope and blessed assurance, inspired by the courage, empathy, kindness, and vision of the saints, including Barbara. May the Souls of the Departed rest in peace. May Christ in our hearts be our Holy Traveling Companion out there so that we might share or advent hope, light in the darkness. O Come, O Come Emmanuel!

Witness to A Life Well-Lived

My beloved wife, Barbara Bea Troxell, died serenely in our Pitzer Lodge home on October 17th, 2025, shortly after her 90th birthday, with wonderful care from our gracious Assisted Living staff, SCAN and VNA Hospice staff, and with all kinds of visits and support from dear ones.

I've received many wonderful tributes to Barbara from a wide range of folk. Especially heart-warming has been messages from women clergy, former students and co-workers describing her as a pioneering spiritual guide, a loving pastor of pastors, and a source of encouragement and deepened faith, who lived as an ardent Jesus follower.

Barbara's career as a United Methodist included diverse roles as a parish pastor; campus minister within the YMCA movement at Ohio Wesleyan and Stanford Universities; District Superintendent, conference program staff, seminary professor, local church worshipping activist, public spokesperson for justice, civil rights, including women's rights, and pacifism, appointed member of national commissions and boards, ecumenical and interfaith representative. Consistently in each role she was a supportive and trusted counselor and confidant to those in leadership roles.

With her devotion to profound worship, she was also a vowed member of the Order of Saint Luke and at Pilgrim Place a stalwart in the Eucharistic Circle, honoring her passion for the sacramental and liturgical traditions of Christianity.

Barbara was born and happily raised in Brooklyn with summers at Vermont's Lake Dunmore. Her parents were educators and summer camp staff. Her father was the church organist at Kings Highway Methodist Church where she was shaped by music, a good Christian education and a strong faith. She sang in the choir, played basketball in the church league, held leadership roles in the Methodist youth fellowship and camping and felt a strong sense of calling to ministry from an early age before she knew that women could be ordained.

Barbara was stretched intellectually and spiritually at historically Quaker Swarthmore college, preaching in local rural churches while earning her degree in English literature with a minor in religion. She graduated from Union Theological Seminary in 1959 with a focus on New Testament studies and pastoral psychology. A study year followed at New College University of Edinburgh. Her Scottish sojourn included retreat

experience with the Iona Community, exposure to the Taizé Community, and real-world exposure to the travails of Palestine and Israel.

She was then ordained, the first woman to receive full membership in her New York United Methodist Conference and appointed to a pastorate as the first ordained woman that church had ever experienced.

Barbara visited Grailville, loved that community, and became a first Protestant and first clergy member of the International Grail as they pioneered in developing Catholic feminist theology and faith-based social action and service.

I have heard often how folks still look back at a wonderful team ministry including Barbara at Palo Alto Presbyterian Church in the early 1970s, and her mentoring as Dean of Students at PSR in Berkeley. In those years she deeply studied Jungian Analysis with the Guild for Psychological Studies and later also studied with the Shalem Institute for Spiritual Formation. These studies reinforced her life-long introspection, meditation, mysticism, her introverted aspect, and her disciplined journal-keeping.

In 1974 her Bishop called her to staff the California- Nevada Conference for four years and then become Superintendent of the Golden Gate District, a culturally diverse region stretching along the coast above and below San Francisco, exercising her pastoral and ecumenical gifts. It was during those years that it became widely known that more than one of the Jurisdictional Conferences advocated another pioneering UMC role for Barbara as a Bishop, but she declined and instead leaned strongly into her style of ministerial leadership-- a ministry of deep friendships, collegiality and inspiration for the next generation.

Barbara began a decade of marriage to Hugh Horan, who had been a Roman Catholic priest, and they moved to Chicago. She soon was Director of Field Education and Spiritual Formation on the faculty at Garrett-Evangelical, where for the next 12 years she emphasized mentoring students on practical aspects of church work and on claiming their authority as pastors, priests, prophets, and spiritual directors. She also taught United Methodist Studies.

Barbara's birth family was small in numbers. Neither of her parents had siblings, Barbara had no children, and she had one sister, Sally Criticos. Sally's daughters Amy and Sarah and their families are very

very dear to Barbara, their 'Aunt Bootie.' But in another sense her family was already enormous because of her close friendships with her former students, colleagues, parishioners, and ecumenical partners.

Her 'family' expanded by hundreds of us residents and staff in 2002 when she moved into our beloved Pilgrim Place community, which, at its best, functions as a family should, as we take care of one another. Her family suddenly grew in another manner when she agreed to marry me in 2006. What a privilege I was gifted! I had become a resident in 2004, after the death of my first wife, Luana. Barbara and her small family were pulled into the welcoming embrace of my complex dispersed family, including what is now our five young great-grandchildren, our six grandchildren, their parents, my sibling's families and many other family members.

Barbara co-established and for several years led the Napier Initiative Council. Over the past 15 years that project has mentored over 160 graduating students at the five undergraduate Claremont colleges and provided \$450,000 and awards to 33 student-developed pioneering ecological and social change projects. Moderator Bear Ride, in reporting on Barbara's death, said "Barbara quickly became in her daily living the one who shows up, lends a hand, listens and cares deeply, skillfully leading our community on the board and as moderator. Our community regularly turned to her as the trusted presider at memorials and other times of prayer and worship, and the source of ongoing confidential spiritual direction, including for several women pastors."

Shortly before Barbara's death, she published her memoir <u>"My Life Journey: Both Upwards And Downwards."</u> I would love to get a copy into your hands if you wish, either as a 'real' book or a code good for a free e-book download.


We are unique human beings linked with all of creation and gathered from diverse places to share a ministry faithfully, to raise questions hopefully, to work for justice lovingly.
